The awardwinning story, based Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, is set in 1950s New York. We learn about the violence between two teenage street gangs of the

city at that time: The Sharks, who were immigrants from Puerto Rico and their rivals The Jets, who were of white American origins. When Maria, a young Puerto Rican girl and ex-Jet, Tony, fall in love, we see a tragic story of love, gang warfare, social issues, and death unfold. This powerful storyline enchanted the whole class who found it exciting. We interviewed some of the students to get their take on how preparations were going. Dalya (playing Maria) said it was a "very ambitious, motivating and effort demanding project". Gabriel (playing Maria's lover Tony) also thought it was a great idea and was convinced it was going to be a great play as long as everyone tried their best.

The overall opinion from the class was positive and they believed that they had learned a lot during the year, although they would



have liked more time to prepare for the final performance.

It is via the show that they will get to showcase their musical talents. There were very funny moments, sad moments where people cried, and a whole lot of singing.

We are looking forward to watching the show at the end of June before students break up for the summer vacation.

Budding Ambassadors

The finals of the 5th edition of Ambassadeur en Herbe, a worldwide debate contest, took place in Paris. Bringing students together to discuss their opinions on matters of the 21st century, this contest focuses on a linguistic and educational encounter.

Since 2012, the educational service of the AEFE (Agence pour l'Enseignement Français à l'Etranger) has incorporated all the institutions of its network in this global project.

This project highlights the international characteristic of the French educational establishments abroad. It also encourages students to take an interest in international issues, to think about them, and to discuss them in the context of their host country, while exercising their oratory capacities.

Ambassadeur en Herbe is a three tier contest. The first part takes place at the participants' school,



the next is on regional level and finally there is the international level. For this 5th edition, more than 10,000 students from over 100 schools participated. The regionals were held in 10 strategic world zones and the finalists gathered in Paris for a three-day event, where they debated about "the values of Olympism". This was held in the conference center of the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

This year, Lycée Vincent van Gogh was represented by Eléa van der Helm-Kurtycz (class 5).

"All our students participated with enthusiasm and presented really good speeches," affirms Eric Ballet, the teacher responsible for the participation of Lycée Vincent van Gogh in Ambassadeur en Herbe.

According to him Ambassadeur en Herbe is a great experience that enriches one's knowledge, and enables students to meet





people from around the globe.

"And, not only is it fun," explains Eléa, "it is also very educational. It helped me and my team to gain self-confidence."

"The fact that someone in my class won Ambassadeur en Herbe this year, motivates me to do it next year," says Yara, who was deeply inspired by this year's event.

Hey! Do you want to work on a computer but it doesn't work?! We will help you fix it!

Verify the cables:

The cable problem is common. Here is the solution.

The problem is usually with the cables going to the monitor. If you do not see 2 cables going into the monitor, then there is a problem. There should be one cable lying around somewhere otherwise you will not be able to use the computer.

The Flying King

Recently, information has leaked out that the king of the Netherlands, Willem Alexander, also has a job as a pilot in the KLM Dutch airlines.

When flying an airplane, he is usually airborne for 30 minutes to 3 hours. Around twice a month, he makes short flights to famous cities around Europe, using the city hopper. He ended his 21 year career as a regular guest pilot on KLM fokker 70, another city hopper plane

He added cheekily that very few people recognize him as he walks through Amsterdam's Schiphol Airport, dressed in his KLM uniform and cap.

Even when he makes occasional announcements to the passengers, King Willem Alexander says that,

as the co-pilot, he doesn't have to say his name and people don't usually recognize his voice!

-"Most people don't pay any attention anyway!" he added cheerfully at the end of an interview.

Willem Alexander has given up his position as pilot in the Dutch Cargo Company: Martinair. The Dutch King is envisioning a training course to fly a Boeing 737, since the Fokker 70 fleet is going out of service, and they will no longer available.

The 50-year-old father of three princesses, and monarch to 17 million Dutch citizens, calls flying a "hobby" as piloting planes enables him to forget his royal duties, putting them aside (on the ground) as he takes off! He prefers flying during the nighttime.



Although the information, that the King of The Netherlands was also a trained pilot, was not withheld from the public, his exact piloting schedule has been unknown until now. Willem Alexander said in an interview with a Dutch newspaper:

- "I am rarely recognized by passengers, especially since the security was tightened on board planes after the 9/11 attacks.

Before September 11th, on a day where I was flying a KLM plane, the cockpit door would sometimes pop open. As I was noticed, passengers often came to have a look, and thought it was pleasantly surprising that I was sitting there!"


"I think that the pier has been modernized and the zip line and the Ferris Wheel will attract more visitors. I really recommend visiting the Pier."

GEMINI TURBINE PARK

The twins of the Future

In the North Sea, a wind turbine park was recently opened by John Brace, Chairman of the Board of Directors of Gemini, on the 8th of May 2017.

The park is one of the biggest in the world, and powers 800 thousand houses in the Netherlands with sustainable energy. Over the next fifteen years Gemini will meet the energy needs of 1.5 million consumers.

Matthais Haag, Managing Director of Gemini, said at the opening ceremony: "We successfully Gemini ahead completed schedule, under budget and with an excellent safety record. Now fully operational, Gemini will reduce the Netherlands' CO2 emissions by 1.25 million tons. We are proud to make this contribution to the realization of Netherlands' sustainability the targets."

The Netherlands signed a treaty with the European Union for the production of green energy in the future. Other countries are trying to find ways of producing green electricity to replace unsustainable energy and fossil fuels.

The turbine park is separated into 2 sections: One section is located opposite the island of Ameland, and the other is stationed beside the island of Schiermonnikoog.

The creators of the park named the two sections Gemini, which means twins in Latin, to represent the 75 identical turbines in each part.

The wind power which ranges on a scale from 1 to 12, is powered by the 36 kilometers per hour winds from the North Sea. Though the turbines begin turning at the power of 2, 6 is the ideal condition required to produce energy. Once the wind scale reaches 10, the turbines automatically shut down, as a safety precaution.

The turbines are not unanimously accepted by the public though, as some citizens think that they are visually unpleasant while others complain about the ongoing noise that the turbines generate. For these reasons, turbine parks are more commonly erected in the ocean, far from the coast, but some do exist on land.



Telling us about Gemini's close bond with nature, Matthias Haag says: "We worked closely with the Wadden Sea Association in order to respect the natural environment."

Gemini marks a turning point in the way we think about wind energy. We look forward to seeing the development of Gemini, the twins of the future.
